There are four names missing from the list. These are—the Rev. Denis O'Kearnoy, Rev. Mr. Buckley, Rev. Mr. Ryan, and Rev. Mr. Clang. These names belong to the dead—four additional victims of the fever and famine policy of England's rule. From the death beds of the poor these last victims—all struck down within six weeks—caught the fatal fever.

Already the diocese of Waterford has followed the example of the diocese of Clovne and Ross. On Friday last the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore assembled his clergy in the vestry of the Cathedral of Waterford, and adopted an address, which is described by the local journal as being "a strong" appeal to the Queen, calling for the immediate assemblage of the Irish Parliament in Dublin as the only mode of saving the empire and securing the crown.

The Cork Examiner introduces the above address by the following article:

A few days since, we anticipated the formal publication of the loyal and patrictic address of the Bishop and Glergy of Cloyno and Ross; to-day we publish it formally, fortified with a long list of numes—is fact, the names of all the clargy of the united diocesses, without exception

clergy of the united diocesses, without exception. We challenge attention to this document; for we hold it to be one of the most important that has been given to the public since the commencement of the agitation in favour of self-government. The decument is deliberately con-ceived, and firmly as well as moderately expressed. It is not in any way like the vehement outpouring of excited and reckless men. It is the grave, displied, unimpassioned declaration of opinion—the adjemp and sarnest warning, of ministers of religion, led and advised by their religious supe rior - a thoughtful, retiring, but determined man-one who throughout his long and honoured life, has been consistently aversete all kinds of agitation—one who has never yet been induced to retire from his spiritual seplusion -one who has never spoken from a public platform-the present venerated Bishop of Cloyee and Rost. From his exalted and respon-sible position, as the spiritual head of nearly half a million of people, he sees, with the eyes and heart of a father, the desciation that is raveging the fairest portion of his foldhe sees a brave, intelligent, plous people a people possessing every physical excellence and moral quality that can make a nation happy and great be sees this people plunged in a state of woe and wrethbeineds beyond all parallel in olvilland society and scarcely to be matched among the darkost, the rudest, the most brutish and debased races of savage life. This good blahop—this grave, thoughtful, unimpaistoned manusees the condition of the people; and while feeling for their misory in the deep tenderness of his paternal heart he clearly understands the true, the great, the patent cause of that condition of that woe, and of that misory. Dr. Walsh knows that a people cannot be happy, cannot be prosperous, cannot be empouraged, dannot be stimulated, cannot be properly or wiedly ruled by strangers always cold, indifferent, and scornful often hostile and bating. Even his patience is worn out by the long watching for change, for a better order of things, which sanguine or
