17. Ballinahinch, 22-23 Aug. Rev. P. Ayan's Visit. Rept. 382 Confirmations; 3 missals, 2 chalices, 4 suits of vestments; no Confraternities; 30 mentally communicants; there are many of his parishioners not permanently resident, working at the mines; 2 protestants received; 4 Mational and 1 other schools; lass in Ballinahinch at 9% o'c. and at Milloscully at 11% o'c.; curate's collection in October.

18. Doen, 24 Aug. (1 p.)

Rev. J. O'Dwuer to S.

The curate of Doon writes on behalf of Fr. Hickey, P.P. who is absent; sends S. a list of the apostates which covers the years 1849-52; the total number of apostates is 36, most of them children; the list given on eath, and attested before S. and Fr. Howley, V.G.; Fr. O'D. virilicates his parish and maintians that the evidence given to done is false; it is a sad business when our friends believe such lying tales.; the priests of the parish deserve praise, not blame; they have fought against the powers of darkness for years; summarises the real reasons behind the apostasy of these 36 people (only 13 adults); 614 Catholic houses have been thrown down and their inmates thrown out into the world, and an easy proy to the Protestant seducers, who offered money, food and shelter in exchange for their religion; some 300 people have died of starvation within one period of six months; as Doon was the centre of distress, it was made the centre of an all-out attack by the -ible pocieties, and extra parsons were sent there; almost all the 'perverts' live (or lived) on land belonging to the Board of Erasmus Smith schools, and hundreds preferred to be evicted rather than give up their faith; many have died for their faith; thus, while there is cause to mean over the fall of some few (who were all in extreme want), there

is reason to rejoice over the salvation of so many who might have fallen; several of the 'perverto' have received into canted; during the last 3 years they have received into the Church 33 persons who were not Catholics previously; the accusations made against the people of Doon have only made them more fervent in the practice of their religion; this is evidenced by the increase in the numbers who have joined the various sodalities, and by the way in which the May devotions were attended.   The columnies which have been reported to Rome and believed by the authorities there, have been widespread for a long time, but were not bilived by anyone who know the real situation; gives the same details as Fr. O'D. has given in his letter of 24 Aug; meet of those who perverted were on the very threshold of death and were not responsible or in their full and clear state of mind; those who have made the public accusation wish to obtain more money from ingland for their proselytising efforts, and have no regard for truth or human respect.

Pallasgrean, 12 Cet. . Rov. J. Ryan to 3. 35. Sends S. a full list of the apostates in his parish since 1848; total number comes to 7S (only 24 adults, the rest children); all the false reports have come from the Protestant ministers of the Church of England, who have been working in the neighbourhood and who wished to obtain further sums of money from Exeter Hall; they used a trick, in gathering together in Pallasgrean all the perverts from Cappamore, and vice versa, when the inspector came to count the 'converts'; the famine, the evictions on the porpoerty of Col, Wyndam and the Board of Arasmus Smith Charities, and the insolvency of the local Protestant parson, who used the distressed times to obtain money to pay his debts, the dreadful conditions of the inmates of the Tipperary Union Workhouse, where most of the apostasies took place at a time when deaths averaged 25 a week; only 2 have 'perverted' in the last year and a half, despite all the temptations laid before them; many have died rather than renounce the faith of their fore-fathers; in the last four years there have been 82 persons received into the Church; since making the enclosed list, one more of the perverts has recanted; it is to be hoped that the 2 new Pational schools will be a means of preventing any further loss of souls; thanks S. for granting him and his curate the necessary powers to deal with the situation.

Dr. Wm. Keane to S.

He has brought the decrees of the Provincial Synod to the Propaganda; the cardinals will discuss them as seen as possible, but it may be Feb. before any decision is given; the question of the extension of Ross diocese is under consideration; the name of Dr. Moriatty, though 2nd on their list, is favoured by Roman authorities.

In a P.S. Dr. R. notes that letters to Ireland from Rome should go via barseilles, whereas from Ireland to Aone, via Belgium.

S. adds a note that he received the letter on 5 Jan. 1854 and replied the same day.

Michael Bradley to Board of Guardians, Urlingford Union Gives evidence that during his period in prison for pulling potatoes, he was approached by proseltyising turnkeys and other officials, who offered him his liberty if he turned Protestant; in order to avoid a second turn of hard labour(he had got sick after the

plenty of meat; he now wishes to retract and to? registered as a Catholic; the Board of Guardians ordered that the religion of Bradley be changed to Catholic in the Register, and also that an officienquiry be made into his accusations about prosed within the presencts of the prison.

According to a note on last page, Bradley was in in Kilkenny; it is stated that only the Lord Liet has the power to mitigate a sentence and such act as Bradley describes is against the law.
